SAFETY OFFICER-KEN ROBERTS

FLIGHT LINE FIRE SAFETY

Fires on the flight line is never a good thing. Especially an uncontrolled one with fuel spilling out. I was reading the AMA Gas Turbine Program (510-A) recently and on page 2 of the document, it has flight line requirements for turbine powered aircraft. I think you'll all agree, these requirements should be for all nitrile and gas types as well. Specifically, a "B/C"-rated or equivalent fire extinguisher shall be present for all engine starts and water-based fire-fighting equipment shall be present on the field. A phone shall be present at the site, along with the phone number of the closest fire department or 911, whichever has been determined to be most effective for emergency response.

Since we have a couple of new turbine jet aircraft flyers, the club has purchased a 5-gal fire pump sprayer back-pack to have on hand in the event of a crash and a grass fire ensues. I've used these in my younger days as a firefighter and they work great for fighting small grass fires. It weighs ~ 40 lbs when full of water and easy to use. It operates just like a "super soaker" squirt gun, just pump the handle (circled below) and water sprays out the end.



We also have a 5-lb B/C fire extinguisher inside the club house. Per the rules above, a B/C fire extinguisher shall be present during engine starts. This means the fire extinguisher should be outside on the flight line area and ready to use.



To use this type of fire extinguisher, remember this acronym **P.A.S.S.**

Pull pin

Aim the nozzle at base of fire

Squeeze handle to discharge

Sweep nozzle back and forth

Next time you're at the field, please look at the fire extinguisher(s) we have in the club house to know where to find them. Look at the club field's address location that's mounted on the back of the door. If you're not comfortable using a fire extinguisher or the fire is too big, don't put yourself in harm's way, call 911 for immediate help. In the event of poor cell service, you may need to walk up the hill to make the call. If for any reason you use the B/C (dry chem) fire extinguisher, even if it was just a few seconds, it must be recharged or replaced. Please notify me or one of the other club officers.
